

^{1.} A strong majority of school and district leaders believe the state of education in Tennessee is "good" or "excellent". (63.91% combined). This is a 6.16% increase of "good" or "excellent" compared to last year's survey. 2. A very strong majority of school and district leaders classroom effectiveness and student achievement when placing students in classrooms (70.17% combined). 3. Options included Budgeting, Staffing, Scheduling, Transportation and "Other." 4. School and district leaders generally support the idea of weighting funding based on student need for at-risk categories of students, such as low-income, English language learners, and special education students. (46.5% combined).
